#### **ALBERT EINSTEIN AT SCHOOL - by Patrick Pringle**

**<u>I. Short Answer Type Questions:</u>** Answer the following questions in not more than 30-40 words.

#### Q1. Why did the History teacher dislike Albert?

Ans. The History teacher, Mr Braun, never liked Albert who said frankly that there was no point in learning dates. He could not tell the year when the French were defeated at Waterloo. Mr Braun called the boy a disgrace and told him to leave school at once.

#### Q2. Who was Mr Koch? What did he think about Albert?

Ans. Mr Koch was Albert's Maths teacher at the Munich school. He had a very high opinion about Albert's brilliance. He even admitted that Albert would soon be able to teach him. He gave a glowing letter of reference to Albert that he was good enough to study higher Math.

#### Q3. Who was Yuri? How did he help Albert?

Ans. Yuri was Albert's friend and the only person who stood by Albert when he was feeling miserable at school and also at his lodging. He helped Albert with his sincere advice. # 1. What do you understand of Einstein's nature from his conversations with his history teacher, his mathematics teacher and the head teacher?

Albert Einstein At School by Patrick Pringle makes us reflect on the purpose of education – is it information gathering or insight formation. Einstein was an intelligent student but not good at rote learning of dates and facts in history, only his mathematics teacher acknowledged his brilliance. Young Einstein hated learning dates and openly confessed that he did not see any point in learning dates as it could be looked up in books. Exchanges between Einstein and History teacher show that Einstein is honest and truthful. He admits his shortcomings frankly. He has firm and well defined opinions and explains precisely what he thinks. thus his basic intelligence, logical reasoning and lucid expression are highlighted. It is important to see that he showed no disrespect to his teachers in spite of provocation. Einstein's conversations with his mathematics teacher show the sparks of genius at a young age. He excelled in mathematics in which he had a natural inclination. His Mathematics teacher praises him and says that he couldn't teach Einstein more and probably he would soon be able to teach him. He further says that Albert was ready to enter a college or institute for the study of higher mathematics. The encounter with the head teacher shows how Einstein kept his cool and confidence in grave situations. Einstein was a thinker and an articulate student who was self-confident, candid, humble and strong willed.

(introduction - got into a school in Munich - In spite of his best efforts - failed to cope with the circumstances - did not bother about poor food, lack of comfort or even the dirt and squalor - strong views about learning - annoyed almost all his teachers - wanted to know the reason or reasons about everything he was taught – un-satisfying curiosity hampered the teaching process in his classes -Only his mathematics teacher recognized his ability - spoke highly Very soon Einstein realized - wasting his time and his father's money - procured a medical certificate testifying to his nervous breakdown - recommending six month's absence from the school - before he could use it, - summoned him - told Einstein - go of his own accord, otherwise - formally expelled)
