Transitive verbs have two forms: Active and Passive.

The Verb that expresses the action done by the Subject is said to be in Active Voice.

Example: The hunter shot the tiger.

The Verb that expresses what is done to the subject is said to be in Passive Voice.


Example: The tiger was shot by the hunter.



Voice is the form of the Verb which shows whether the Subject does something or the Subject has something done to it.

Points to Remember while changing the Active Voice into the Passive Voice:

- The Subject of the Verb in the Active Voice is made the object of the Verb in the Passive Voice and is introduced with the preposition by or with some other suitable preposition.
- > The Object of the active verb is put in the Subject Position.
- The Number of the Verb is changed according to the number and person of the Subject.
- The verb in the active voice is always changed to the past participle form of the verb in the passive voice. The verb changes to be+ past participle.



Study this table to understand how the verb is changed into the passive form in different tenses.

Tense	Active voice	Passive voice
Simple present	Tina bakes a cake.	A cake is baked by Tina.
Present continuous	Tina is baking a cake.	A cake is being baked by Tina.
Present perfect	Tina has baked a cake.	A cake has been baked by Tina.
Simple past	Tina baked a cake.	A cake was baked by Tina.
Past continuous	Tina was baking a cake.	A cake was being baked by Tina.
Past perfect	Tina had baked a cake.	A cake had been baked by Tina.
Simple future	Tina will bake a cake.	A cake will be baked by Tina.
Future perfect	Tina will have baked a cake.	A cake will have been baked by Tina.

Imperative Sentences:

Imperative sentence in the Passive Voice takes this form:

Let +object+ be+ past participle

Active Voice: Help me. Passive Voice: Let me be helped

The passive form has to begin with 'You', when the object of the verb in Active Voice is not given.

Active Voice: Get out. Passive Voice: You are ordered to get out.

Interrogative Sentences

It may be noted that Who is changed into 'By whom' and Whom into 'Who' in Passive Voice.
