### WHAT IS AN IDIOM?

An idiom is a phrase that, when taken as a whole, has a meaning you wouldn't be able to deduce from the meanings of the individual words.

### Examples

1. Blessing in disguise - something that appears to be a misfortune can have unexpected benefits.




"Losing that job was a *blessing in disguise* because otherwise I wouldn't have found my current job which I love."
