Subject Verb Agreement

What is subject-verb agreement?

The subject-verb agreement simply means the **subject** and **verb** must agree in number. If the subject is singular (one), the verb must be singular. If the subject is plural (more than one), the verb must be plural.


For example: She <u>runs</u> every morning.

They <u>run</u> every morning.

Subjects must agree with the verb in number and tense.



One robot loves apples.



Two robots love apples.



Agreement

- 1. The subject and verb must agree in number: both must be singular, or both must be plural.
 - ✓ The dog *barks* at strangers.
 - ✓ The dogs \underline{bark} at strangers.
- 2. The number of the subject (singular or plural) is not changed by words (or a phrase) that come in between the subject and the verb.
 - ✓ One of the cars is parked in the wrong place.
 - ✓ One of the answers <u>was</u> incorrect.
- 3. Some subjects always take a singular verb even though the meaning may seem plural.
 - ✓ Each of the students <u>has</u> a unique talent.
 - ✓ Everyone in the class *enjoys* reading.

These subjects always take singular verbs:


Each, either, neither, one, no one, everyone, someone, anyone, nobody, somebody, anybody, everybody

- 4. The following words may be singular or plural, depending upon their use in a sentence: some, any, all, most.
 - ✓ Most of the furniture <u>is</u> modern.
 - ✓ Most of the teachers were present.




- 5. Subjects joined by "and" are plural. Subjects joined by "or" or "Nor" take a verb that agrees with the last subject.
 - ✓ Kiran and Varun <u>are</u> playing chess.
 - ✓ Neither Kiran nor Varun <u>was</u> present at the party.


When two subjects are joined by 'as well as', the verb agrees with the first subject.




- ✓ Here *comes* the school bus.
- ✓ There <u>are</u> many apples in the basket.




- ✓ The choir <u>sings</u> beautifully in unison.
- ✓ The choir <u>are</u> wearing different colored outfits.






✓ The Arabian Nights <u>is</u> a famous collection of stories.



- ✓ Twenty rupees is the bus fare.
- ✓ Ten years <u>is</u> a long time to wait.



- ✓ My brother $\underline{doesn't}$ (not don't) play football.
- ✓ They <u>don't</u> (not doesn't) play cricket after school.

- 11. When two subjects are joined by 'as well as', together with, along with, etc the verb agrees with the first subject.
 - ✓ The teacher, as well as the students, is excited about the trip.
 - ✓ The books, along with the pen, <u>were</u> on the table.
