Modals are those helping verbs, which express the 'mode' or 'manner' of the actions indicated by the main verbs. They express ability, possibility, probability, permission, obligation, etc. The most commonly used

We use modals to show if we believe something is certain, possible or impossible:

Eg: My keys must be in the car.

It might rain tomorrow.


That can't be Peter's coat. It's too small.

We also use them to do things like talk about <u>ability</u>, <u>ask permission</u>, and <u>make requests</u> and <u>offers</u>:

Eg: I can't swim.

May I ask a question?
Could I have some tea, please?


Would you like some help?
