THEME

Mrs. Packletide's Tiger written by HH Munro has various themes of pride, insecurity, jealousy, appearance, selfishness, control, and blackmail.

At the very beginning of the short story, we can see the theme of jealousy being discussed by portraying the character of Mrs. Packletide, who is extremely jealous of Loona Bimberton who has become very famous after she was conveyed in a plane by an Algerian pilot. She wants to prove herself better by shooting a tiger. However, instead of hunting it herself, she arranges everything with the help of villagers and a paid shooter. This shows how people sometimes pretend and spend money just to get praise and attention. Overcome by jealousy she loses a huge amount of money when she is blackmailed by Miss Mebbin in the end.

The theme of Pride is also represented by Mrs. Packletide as her pride took a downfall when the news of Loona's adventures were talked about in the social circles. The story reveals that both Mrs. Packletide and Loona are insecure about themselves. Both women feel a general animosity toward each other. The end of the story represents irony as HH Munro might be suggesting that Mrs. Packletide and all the other villagers cannot kill a tiger as they are capable of only killing a goat. The story also shows how human pride can lead to foolish actions. In a humorous way, the writer reminds us that true respect cannot be earned through lies or show-off.

JUSTIFICATION OF THE TITLE

The title *Mrs. Packletide's Tiger* is significant because it places the central character at the heart of the story, much like the titles of Shakespearean plays. The entire narrative revolves around Mrs. Packletide—a wealthy woman in British colonial India—who is determined to hunt a tiger, not for the thrill of the chase, but simply to elevate her social status. To achieve this, she hires a skilled hunter and instructs him to arrange everything for her grand moment.

However, things do not go exactly as planned. The tiger, rather than being a mere trophy, becomes a powerful symbol of the dangers of envy and the steep cost of chasing social prestige. The title also hints at the story's satirical and ironic tone. Mrs. Packletide is so desperate to outshine her social rival, Loona Bimberton, that she completely misses the absurdity of her own actions.

Another reason the title is befitting is its focus on the word *tiger*. The animal is at the center of Mrs. Packletide's obsession, representing both her ambition and the futile nature of her pursuit. At the same time, the tiger takes on a deeper meaning, symbolizing the darker side of British colonialism in India—where native wildlife and people were often exploited for personal gain.

Therefore, the title perfectly captures the essence of the story: a biting critique of vanity, the perils of envy, and the ethical cost of seeking social status at any expense.

CHARACTER SKETCH

Mrs. Packletide

Mrs. Packletide is a wealthy, vain, and self-centered woman obsessed with social status. She gains popularity after being flown by an Algerian aviator and is respected for procuring a tiger skin—a challenging feat at the time. Her high sense of self-respect is evident when she feels unsettled by Mrs. Packletide's invitation, recognizing it as a mere attempt to overshadow her.

Although admired for her charisma, Loona enjoys boasting about her accomplishments, making her a bit of a show-off. Her adventurous spirit reflects the fascination with exploration and thrill-seeking that was fashionable among the British upper-class during Saki's time.

Miss Mebbin

Miss Mebbin is a crafty, cunning, and highly opportunistic woman who knows how to manipulate situations for her own benefit. She presents herself as a harmless companion to Mrs. Packletide, adopting a sisterly attitude, but beneath this face, she is calculative and self-serving.

She quickly recognizes the flaws in Mrs. Packletide's tiger hunt and seizes the opportunity to exploit them. Clever and sharp-witted, she discreetly threatens to expose the truth about the tiger's death, ensuring she gains a financial advantage. Her opportunism reflects her ability to turn any situation to her benefit, even at the expense of others.

Additionally, Miss Mebbin enjoys gossip and has a keen awareness of people's weaknesses, using this knowledge to her advantage. Through her character, Saki highlights how even those from lower social classes can outsmart the wealthy, using wit and cunningness rather than status or wealth.

The Tiger

The tiger in *Mrs. Packletide's Tiger* is simply living its life in the jungle when it becomes an unfortunate victim of human greed and ambition. Though it appears threatening, the story reveals that it is old, weak, and no longer capable of hunting or defending itself. Far from being a fearsome predator, it is a vulnerable creature caught in the schemes of those seeking personal gain.

Mrs. Packletide's hunt is not about bravery or survival but about social status, making the tiger's death a tragic and senseless act of violence. Its fate underscores the reckless exploitation of animals for vanity and personal ambition. Through this, the story critiques the selfishness of human nature and the ethical cost of using living beings as mere symbols of prestige.

Villagers

They are money minded, shrewd however, loyal to Mrs. Packletide. They are helpful and organized the entire hunting expedition effectively.

They are eager to help Mrs. Packletide in her tiger hunt because of the financial reward she offers. They arrange for an old and feeble tiger to be available, ensuring an easy "hunt." Their willingness to manipulate the situation for money highlights human greed and opportunism.
