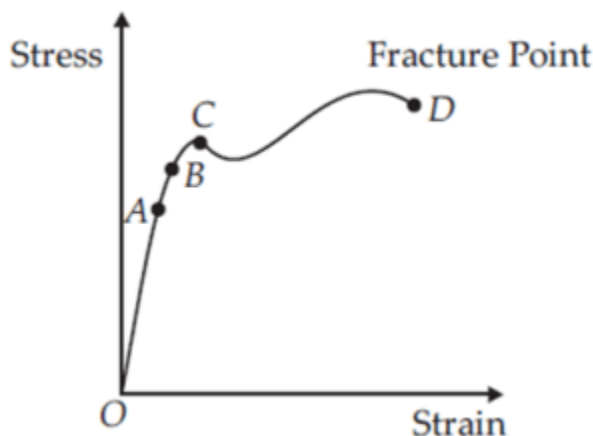

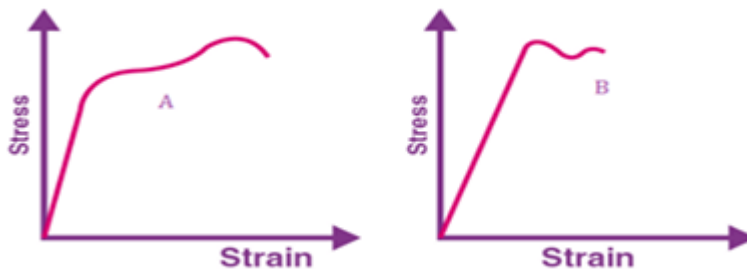

15. The proportional region within the elastic limit of the stress-strain curve is of great importance for structural and manufacturing engineering designs. The ratio of stress and strain, called modulus of elasticity, is found to be a characteristic of the material. Experimental observation show that for a given material, the magnitude of the strain produced is same whether the stress is tensile or compressive. The ratio of tensile (or compressive) stress (σ) to the longitudinal strain (ϵ) is defined as Young's modulus and is denoted by the symbol Y.

$$Y = \sigma / \epsilon$$

Since strain is a dimensionless quantity, the unit of Young's modulus is the same as that of stress i.e., N-m^{-2} or Pascal (Pa). As steel has more modulus of elasticity than copper brass and aluminium hence steel is preferred in heavy-duty machines and in structural designs. Wood, bone, concrete and glass have rather small Young's moduli.
